Course: Caste Survey

Elective Course: 1 Credit (16 hours)

1. Course Overview

Caste, as a distinct social institution of Indian society, stirs up ambivalence in the minds and attitudes of people in contemporary India. On the one hand, as modern liberal citizens, we reject caste as a remnant of the past that will eventually die its natural death. On the other, we witness caste-based discrimination and inequality, shaping social attitudes and political behavior of people. Amidst such ambivalence, the recent codification of caste data in Bihar and its release in the public domain has reaffirmed the social and political relevance of caste in Indian society. Thus, it becomes pertinent to understand the current politics around the codification of socio-economic data on caste in its socio-historical context.

This one-credit, elective course, fulfills this purpose by familiarizing students with the socio-political context in which the codification of caste data can be seen. To do so, the course is divided into two modules. The first module focuses on the socio-political relevance of codifying caste data in modern India given the contemporary experiences of caste inequality, discrimination, and mobility in Indian cities, institutes of higher learning, and job markets. The second module delves into the critical junctures in the journey of caste in modern India, leaving behind deep socio-political imprints on Indian society.

2. Learning Outcome

Together, these modules enable the students to critically appreciate the politics of codifying caste data and its potential and limits in advancing democracy and development in neoliberal India.

- Classroom Participation and Discussion (5+5 = 10 Marks): Students will attend minimum 12 lectures, and have to participate in classroom discussions after reading the suggested reading material.
